Day of Mourning honours workers who have been fatality injured on the job

Each worker's death leaves a void that can never be filled in the lives of those left behind, families, friends, co-workers and the community.

This annual Day of Mourning is shared by all of us, including families, those who help families deal with loss, as well as employers and workers who lose friends and colleagues from the workplace.

In Alberta an average of:

- 36 work related fatalities already in 2010.
- 2 workers die each week due to trauma and other causes.
- Approx. 2696 injuries are reported on a weekly basis.
- 521 lost time injuries reported each week.
- 54 workers were permanently disabled each week.

We all have a responsibility to prevent these injuries and deaths. It takes real commitment and dedication to ensure we all go home safe at the end of the day.

The next time you see an unsafe act or condition, **DON'T IGNORE IT** or consider it someone else's problem.

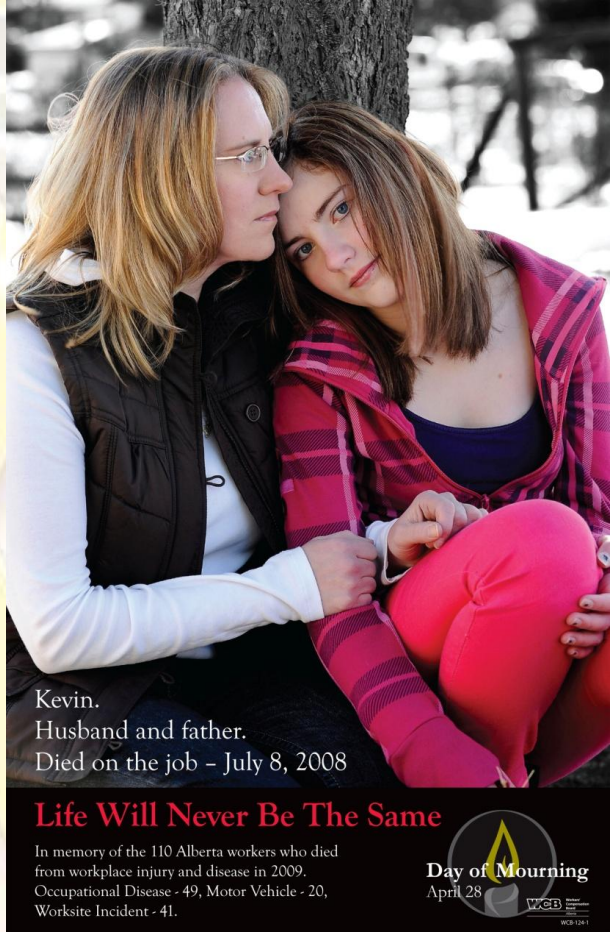
